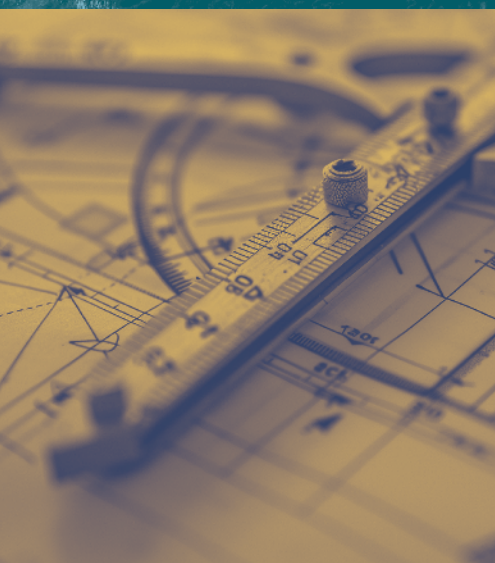

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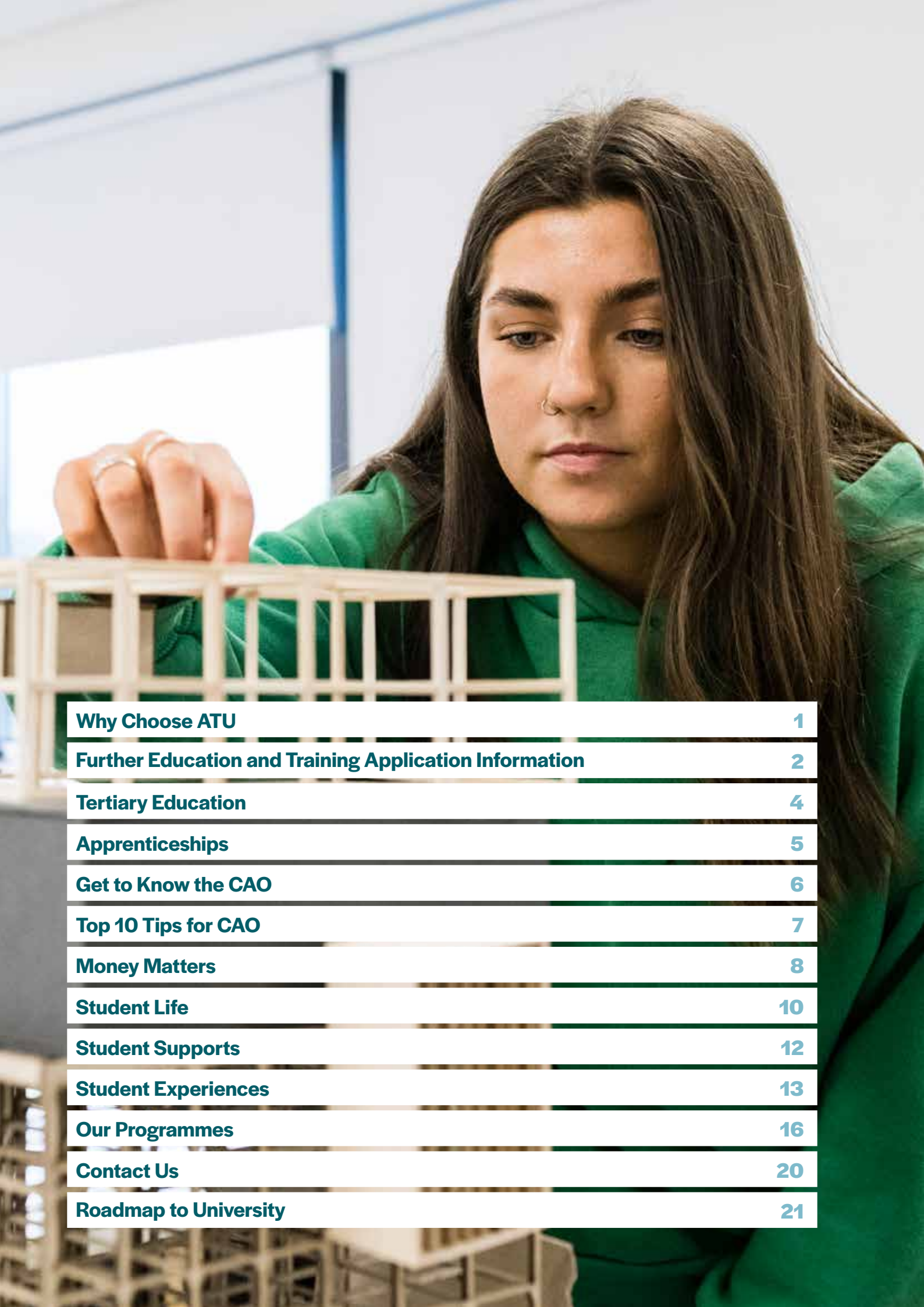

Further Education and Training Application Information

There are many different pathways available for those with Further Education (QQI) qualifications. This guide is to help prospective students explore their options and provide information on taking the next step in their education journey.

Students can use a qualification from a Further Education and Training (FET) course to apply for entry to a programme at ATU.

The FET qualification will depend on the type of course chosen. Many of the one-year courses offer Quality and Qualifications Ireland (QQI) accreditation at Level 5 on the National Framework of Qualifications, while other more advanced courses may offer a QQI Level 6 qualification.

Students can use QQI qualifications to apply for entry to Year 1 or Year 2 of various programmes across ATU as follows:

Applying to Year 1

All applicants for entry to Year 1 of ATU's full-time undergraduate programmes are made through the Central Applications Office (CAO). Applications open during November for programmes starting in September of the following year.

Applying to Year 2 (Advanced Entry)

Students who hold a QQI FET Level 6 major award maybe eligible for consideration to enter directly into Year 2 of related programmes at ATU.

ATU have mapped many QQI FET Level 6 courses in the region to allow advanced entry to certain ATU programmes.

All applicants for consideration for advanced entry to Year 2 of ATU's full-time undergraduate programmes should contact Admissions directly to see if they are eligible for advanced entry.

ATU welcomes applications from people from every educational and personal background. We hope to make the application process as easy as possible for you.

Get to Know the CAO

Eolas maidir leis an CAO

The Central Applications Office (CAO) is a centralised applications system that processes full-time undergraduate programme applications for the higher education institutes in the Republic of Ireland.

Apply to CAO

Applicants can use the CAO system to apply for undergraduate programmes across a mixture of universities and levels using a single application. The levels available on the CAO are Level 6 higher certificates, Level 7 ordinary degrees and Level 8 honours degrees.

Application Timeline:

- Application portal opens: **Early November**
- Normal application deadline: **1st February**
- Change of Mind system opens: **Early May**
- Change of Mind system deadline: **1st July**
- Round 1 offers and available places: **August-September**

Timing for Offers:

Offers will be made to FE applicants in Round 0 (normally early August).

Please be advised that dates and times may change; visit cao.ie for the most up-to-date information.



Top 10 Tips for CAO

10 Leid maidir leis an CAO

1

List your programmes in **order of preference**.

2

Think about **your work experience** and consider if you would like to continue this path or change direction.

3

Think about the **university** location that works well for you and your family.

4

Research your programme and university choices with friends, relatives, and by contacting the university directly – people will be happy to help.

5

Explore common entry programmes which allow **students to study a broad range of subjects** before choosing what area to specialise in.

6

When **deciding** on programmes, **check any** minimum entry requirements, deadlines, restrictions and supplementary information.

7

Attend university open days to meet lecturers and students and tour campuses.

8

Explore advanced entry, apprenticeship and tertiary education options in further education.

9

Fill out level 6/7 and 8 programmes on your CAO form. Remember, there are many routes to a qualification - higher certificates, ordinary degrees and honours degrees. ATU progression routes are a great way to move from one level to the next.

10

Pay attention to CAO communications, deadlines and verify your application details. If you do not receive a Statement by June 1st, contact CAO immediately.

Money Matters

Before you apply to university, the financial costs should be considered. You will need to decide how you will pay your fees and your living costs. You will also need to investigate what financial supports (if any) are available.



Fees

A Student Contribution (registration) fee is set by Government and is payable by all ATU students who do not qualify for a grant or scholarship, per academic year. At registration, students have the option to pay in full or in two instalments.

A Tuition Fee is an additional fee; however, for students attending full-time third level for the first time, the Department of Education normally covers this fee under the Free Fees Initiative scheme for full-time students who are citizens of a Member State of the EU and who meet the residency requirements.

Many of our courses also have a **Materials Fee** which is not covered by grant authorities. If you require information regarding the Material Fees applicable to a programme please contact the student fees office.

Tax Relief

You may be able to claim tax relief on tuition fees that you have paid. Families who pay student contributions for more than one student in a year can also claim tax relief on the second and subsequent contributions (revenue.ie).



Grant

SUSI (Student Universal Support Ireland) provides financial support to eligible students. There are two elements to the student grant – a maintenance grant (contribution towards living costs) and a fee grant (cover all or part of the student contribution fee plus the costs of essential field trips).

Back to Education Allowance (BTEA)

If you are unemployed, a lone parent, or you are receiving a disability allowance from the Department of Social Protection, you may be able to participate in a second or third level education course and get a Back to Education Allowance (BTEA).

It is important to note that you cannot be in receipt of both the BTEA and the maintenance component of a student grant.

In order to receive the BTEA, you must accept your place on a full-time course, and then notify the Department of Social Protection by completing the BTEA application form.

Student Assistance Fund

The Student Assistance Fund is a government fund which provides some additional funding to eligible students who are experiencing financial difficulty while attending university. It can be put towards the expected costs of attending college such as rent, transport, books/materials, equipment, food, utility bills, childcare or medical expenses. The fund opens at the start of the academic year and has application periods in the first and second semester.

Minimum Entry Requirements

The following minimum entry requirements will apply to graduates of QQI/FET Major Award at Level 5 or 6 seeking admission to most courses at ATU:

Level 6 Higher Cert:

A pass in **any** QQI/FET Level 5 or Level 6 Major Award.

Level 7 Bachelor Degree:

A pass in **any** QQI/FET Level 5 or Level 6 Major Award

Level 8 Honours Degree:

A pass with distinction grade in at least three components in any QQI FET Level 5 or 6 Major Award

An FET qualification is not accepted for entry onto the following programmes:

AU620 BEd (Hons) in Teacher Education (Art, Design and Graphics)

AU680 BSc (Hons) in Education (Design, Graphics & Construction)

Programmes with Specific Entry Requirements

QQI FET applicants for all Engineering and some Science programmes in ATU must have completed Major Awards that include a Mathematics module (5N1833, 6N3395, 5N18396, 5N0556 or 5S2246) or meet the Leaving Certificate Maths entry requirement.

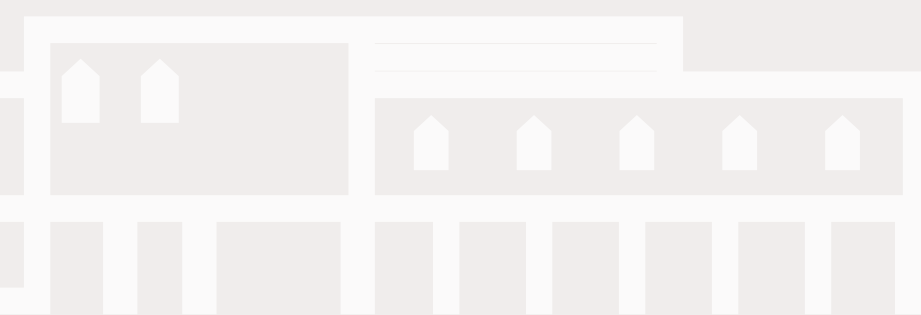
